GOALS OF THE CLASS:

- 1. To help you identify where you are on your spiritual journey to disciple-making
- 2. To give clear and applicable guidance from Scripture on how to progress to the next level of disciple-making
- 3. To encourage you and give you the tools you need to help OTHERS get to the next level of disciple-making also

TERMS TO DEFINE:

- 1. **Disciple** Someone who is continually transforming their life into becoming more like Jesus
- 2. **Disciple Maker** Someone who "disciples" someone else to help transform them into being more like Jesus. Either from a state of non-belief to belief, or, more importantly, to continually turn simple believers into true disciples—those who walk as Jesus walked.

THE 4 CHAIRS REPRESENT THE 4 CHALLENGES OF JESUS:

- 1. THE SEEKER "Come and see" (John 1:39)
- 2. THE BELIEVER "Follow me" (John 1:43)
- 3. THE WORKER "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men" (Mat. 4:19)
- 4. THE DISCIPLE MAKER "Bear much fruit" (John 15:16)

LESSON 1: IF WE WANT THE CHURCH TO SURVIVE AND THRIVE, WE MUST MAKE DISCIPLES WHO MAKE DISCIPLES

- 1. Our church's vision is to be where Christ Lives, People Love, and Lives Change. All these require inside-out life-transformation.
- 2. Jesus commanded Christians to make disciples WHO make disciples (Matthew 28:18-20), otherwise the early church would have died out, and ours will too if we don't do as Jesus commanded.
- 3. The true biblical definition of a disciple is someone whose life is continually being transformed into the image of Christ.
- 4. Making disciples does NOT simply mean converting someone into a believer. It means walking them through the process of transformation to being like Christ, until they themselves are able to make disciples.
- 5. If we want Holly Hill to survive, then we MUST learn to make disciples WHO make disciples.

LESSON 2: JESUS' FOUR CHALLENGES — JESUS DEVELOPED PEOPLE FROM NON-BELIEVERS TO DISCIPLE MAKERS

- 1. Jesus' method of disciple making was to develop people in four distinct stages from a state of non-believer to becoming a disciple maker themselves. We must ALSO work on developing everyone in the congregation to the next level of disciple making.
- 2. Jesus challenged people who didn't know Him to "Come and See" (JOHN 1:39), a no-commitment invitation to learn about Him and consider who He is. These people are SEEKERS, but have not yet committed their lives to Jesus.
- Jesus challenged those who developed a belief in Him by saying "Follow Me" (JOHN 1:43), an invitation to walk along side of Him and learn His way of life. These people are BELIEVERS, but have not yet learned to walk fully in step with Jesus.

4. Jesus challenged those who had been following Him by saying, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men" (MATT. 4:19). This challenge is:

Relational — "Follow me"
Intentional — "I will make you"
Missional — "fishers of men"

This challenge invites believers into ownership of Jesus mission and work. We deepen our **RELATIONSHIP** with Jesus with the **INTENTION** of working toward His **MISSION**. The people who respond to this challenge of Jesus are WORKERS, but not yet fully trained in disciple making.

5. Jesus challenged those who were working alongside Him to "Go And Bear Fruit" (JOHN 15:16). At this point, Jesus no longer calls his disciples "servants," but "friends," (v. 15) because now they have been fully trained, and their agenda aligns completely with that of Jesus. The people who respond to this challenge become DISCIPLE MAKERS, and will train others to be disciple makers as well.

LESSON 3: CHAIR 1 — PEOPLE IN CHAIR 1 (LOST/SEEKERS) ARE SPIRITUALLY DEAD AND NEED A JESUS FOLLOWER TO ENTER THEIR LIFE RELATIONALLY

THE REALITY OF THOSE IN CHAIR 1 — WHAT WE <u>MUST</u> UNDERSTAND IN ORDER TO TRULY CARE ABOUT SOULS:

- They are dead Ephesians 2:1—"As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins"
- 2. They follow the "course of the world," and follow the prince of the power of the air Ephesians 2:2 (ESV) 2 in which you once walked, following the course of this world, following the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work in the sons of disobedience—
- 3. **They are "children of wrath"** Ephesians 2:3 (ESV) 3 among whom we all once lived in the passions of our flesh, carrying out the desires of the body and the mind, and were by nature children of wrath, like the rest of mankind.
- 4. They are hostile to God, and CANNOT submit to Him Romans 8:7 (ESV) 7 For the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God, for it does not submit to God's law; indeed, it cannot.

- 5. **They cannot please God** Romans 8:8 (ESV) 8 Those who are in the flesh cannot please God.
- 6. They are destined to eternity separated from God Revelation 20:15 (ESV) 15 And if anyone's name was not found written in the book of life, he was thrown into the lake of fire.

JESUS' PROCESS TOWARD SEEKERS (MUST BE OUR PROCESS, TOO):

- 1. He left His heavenly home and entered into our world He gave up things in order to minister to seekers.
 - Philippians 2:6–8 (ESV) 6 who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, 7 but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. 8 And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.
- 2. He prepared Himself, learning the context and culture in which He was sent He was prepared to minister to seekers
 - Luke 2:52 (ESV) 52 And Jesus increased in wisdom and in stature and in favor with God and man.
- 3. He made Himself available to the will of His Father He was "on call" to pick up everything and minister to seekers
 - Matthew 3:13 (ESV) 13 Then Jesus came from Galilee to the Jordan to John, to be baptized by him.
 - Luke 22:42 (ESV) 42 saying, "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me. Nevertheless, not my will, but yours, be done."
- 4. He intentionally developed relationships He built friendships with seekers
 - John 1:39 (ESV) 39 He said to them, "Come and you will see." So they came and saw where he was staying, and they stayed with him that day, for it was about the tenth hour.
- 5. He responded to those who showed interest He looked for and waited for a response from seekers to go deeper with them John 1:38 (ESV) 38 Jesus turned and saw them following and said to them, "What are you seeking?" And they said to him, "Rabbi" (which means Teacher), "where are you staying?" Mark 10:51 (ESV) 51 And Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" And the blind man said to him, "Rabbi, let me recover my sight."
- 6. He challenged seekers to repent, believe, and be baptized He followed up and made sure people understood their need for salvation Matthew 3:2 (ESV) 2 "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." Matthew 4:17 (ESV) 17 From that time Jesus began to preach, saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

Mark 16:16 (ESV) — 16 Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned.

THE NEEDS OF PEOPLE IN CHAIR 1:

- I. Chair 1 people need Christ followers in their lives who are willing to enter into their world relationally.
 - A. Who has God placed right around you?
 - B. How can you get more involved in the lives of the people around you?
 - C. How can you build influence and trust within your relationships?
- II. Chair 1 people need Christ followers who have prepared themselves
 - A. Do you have a relationship with Jesus yourself?
 - B. Do you understand the context and culture of the society around you?
 - C. Have you made it a habit of speaking freely about spiritual things?
 - D. How can we prepare ourselves better?
- III. Chair 1 people need Christ followers who make themselves available to the will of the Father
 - A. How can we better make ourselves available to the will of the Father?
 - B. What stands in our way to keep us from being available for God's work?
- IV. Chair 1 people need Christ followers who invest in friendships
 - A. What is preventing us from investing more time and effort into relationships?
 - B. What are some ways we can make investing in friendships more of a priority?
- IV. Chair 1 people need someone to present the gospel clearly to them.
 - A. Do you know how to convey the gospel message on the spur of the moment?
 - B. Do you yourself have a clear understanding of the gospel message so that you can convey it clearly to others?
 - C. What are some ways we can be prepared to present the gospel?

PRINCIPLES FOR MINISTRY TO PEOPLE IN CHAIR 1:

- I. The challenge to "come and see" is a simple challenge.
 - A. Why is it simple?
 - B. How can we make it more commonplace?
- II. Outreach is a process. Many Chair 1 people will need to hear the good news several times before they are ready to receive it. They need SPIRITUAL CPR:
 - C = Cultivate
 - P = Plant
 - R = Reap
- III. We must wholeheartedly believe that JESUS is the ONLY way someone can be in a relationship with God and be saved

- A. John 14:6 (ESV) 6 Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.
- B. Acts 4:12 (ESV) 12 And there is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved."
- C. If we don't reminder ourselves regularly that Jesus is the ONLY way to a relationship with God, how will that hamper our disciple making?

IV. Evangelism is most effective when we are motivated by love.

- A. "Fulfilling the great commission with a great commandment heart"
 - 1. Great commission Matt 28:18-20
 - 2. Great commandment Matthew 22:36–39 (ESV) 36 "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?" 37 And he said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. 38 This is the great and first commandment. 39 And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself.
- B. How can loving God and loving others make us better disciple makers?

V. Disciple making is a byproduct of a healthy body.

- A. John 15:1–2 (ESV) 1 "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinedresser. 2 Every branch in me that does not bear fruit he takes away, and every branch that does bear fruit he prunes, that it may bear more fruit.
- B. What does it say about our congregation if disciple making is at the core of our mission?
- C. What does it say about our congregation if disciple making is left left to a select few in the congregation?

VI. Evangelism is best achieved through relationships.

- A. Jesus fostered relationships John 1:39 (ESV) 39 He said to them, "Come and you will see." So they came and saw where he was staying, and they stayed with him that day, for it was about the tenth hour.
- B. How can we get more relationally focused?

VII. We reap in proportion to what we sow.

- A. What would happen if we never planted the seed of the gospel?
- B. Is more or less likely that we will harvest many souls for God if we are constantly involved in disciple making?

LESSON 4: CHAIR 2 PEOPLE ARE INFANTS IN CHRIST, AND NEED TO LEARN HOW TO LIVE A CHRISTIAN LIFE BY HAVING IT MODELED TO THEM BY MORE MATURE DISCIPLES

DESCRIPTION OF PEOPLE IN CHAIR 2:

- 1. They receive the Holy Spirit when they repent and are baptized (Acts 2:38)
- 2. They are made "alive together with Christ" (Ephesians 2:5).
- 3. They have passed from "death" to "righteousness" (Rom. 5:17-19)
- 4. They are a "new creation" (2 Cor. 5:17)
- 5. They now are following Jesus, learning to walk as He walked (John 1:43)
- **6.** However, they are spiritual infants, requiring the nurture of more mature disciples to help them grow (Hebrews 5:12-14)
- 7. Discussion Questions:
 - **1.** WHY DO SO MANY DISCIPLES FAIL TO MATURE IN CHRIST, AND REMAIN INFANTS INSTEAD?
 - **2.** ARE WE MATURE <u>ENOUGH</u> TO ACCEPT THE DIFFICULT FACT THAT MANY OF US IN THIS ROOM ARE STILL SPIRITUAL INFANTS?
 - 3. WOULD YOU HAVE ENOUGH HUMILITY TO REALIZE THAT YOU MIGHT HAVE FAILED TO MATURE IN CHRIST?
 - 4. WHAT WOULD IT TAKE TO COME TO TERMS WITH THE UNDERSTANDING THAT WE MAY STILL BE SPIRITUAL INFANTS?

JESUS SPENT TIME WITH HIS FOLLOWERS, AND GOT TO KNOW THEM AND MODELED THE CHRISTIAN LIFE FOR THEM IN ORDER TO HELP THEM GROW FROM SPIRITUAL INFANCY

- 1. He took His followers to a wedding at Cana (John 2:1-11)
- 2. Spent a "few days" in Capernaum with His followers (John 2:12)
- 3. He "spent time with them" in Judea (John 3:22)
- 4. Discussion Questions:
 - 1. WHAT DO YOU SUPPOSE THEY DID OR TALKED ABOUT DURING THESE TIMES?
 - 2. DO WE SPEND TIME WITH PEOPLE IN CHAIR 2 AND GET TO KNOW THEM? WHY OR WHY NOT? WHAT SHOULD THE RESULT BE?
 - 3. HOW CAN WE BECOME MORE INTENTIONAL ABOUT SPENDING TIME TOGETHER?
 - 4. ARE WE MODELING THE CHRISTIAN LIFE AS WE SPEND TIME WITH PEOPLE IN CHAIR 2?
 - 5. HOW DO CHILDREN LEARN WHAT TO DO, AND HOW TO DO IT?

JESUS' MODELED SIX FOUNDATIONAL PRINCIPLES OF CHRISTIAN LIVING FOR HIS FOLLOWERS TO GROW INTO:

1. Jesus modeled full dependency on the Holy Spirit

- 1. Jesus was conceived by the Spirit (Luke 1:35)
- 2. Anointed by the Spirit (Luke 4:18; Acts 10:38; Isa. 61:1)
- 3. Filled with the Spirit (Luke 4:1, 14; John 3:34)
- 4. Sealed by the Spirit (John 6:27) (Eph. 1:13)
- 5. Led by the Spirit (Luke 4:1)
- 6. Rejoiced in the Spirit (Luke 10:21)
- 7. Gave commands by the Spirit (Acts 1:2)
- 8. Performed miracles by the power of the Spirit (Matt. 12:28; Luke 4:14–15, 18)
- 9. Was resurrected by the Spirit (Rom. 8:11)
- 10. Through the Spirit presented Himself fully obedient (Heb. 9:14)
- 11. DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:
 - ARE WE FULLY DEPENDENT ON THE HOLY SPIRIT? WHY OR WHY NOT?
 - 2. WHAT IS IT THAT KEEPS US FROM DEPENDING MORE ON THE SPIRIT IN OUR CHRISTIAN WALKS?
 - 3. WHAT DOES A CHRISTIAN LIFE LED BY THE SPIRIT LOOK LIKE?
 - 4. HOW DO YOU PLAN TO BE LED MORE BY THE SPIRIT THIS WEEK?

2. Jesus modeled the centrality of prayer in His life and ministry

- 1. His ministry began in prayer (Luke 3:21)
- 2. His ministry ended in prayer (Luke 23:46)
- 3. Shortly after His baptism the Spirit led Jesus into the wilderness, where He launched His ministry with forty days of fasting and no doubt, lots of prayer (Luke 4:1)
- 4. Jesus slipped away to pray when things got busy (Mark 6:31)
- 5. Before the major decision of appointing his twelve apostles, Jesus spent all night in prayer (Luke 6:12-13)
- 6. Jesus would "OFTEN" slip away into the wilderness to pray (Luke 5:16)
- 7. DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:
 - 1. WHY DO YOU SUPPOSE JESUS PRAYED SO OFTEN?
 - 2. HOW WOULD OUR LIVES BENEFIT FROM MORE PRAYER?
 - 3. HOW CAN WE GET MORE INTENTIONAL ABOUT PRAYING DURING THE TOUGH AND BUSY TIMES?

3. Jesus modeled the importance of obedience to His Father's will

- 1. Jesus was obedient to His earthly parents, Mary and Joseph (Luke 2:51)
- 2. For His entire life He was obedient to His Heavenly Father, which caused suffering, but through the suffering, He learned obedience (Heb. 2:18; 5:8)
- 3. Jesus Himself said, "I seek not to please myself but him who sent me" (John 5:30)

- 4. Jesus said that His will was to do what the Father desired, "Yet not my will, but yours be done" (Luke 22:42)
- 5. Jesus taught His disciples the importance of obedience, telling them to "go and make disciples ... teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you" (Matt. 28:19–20)
- 6. DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:
 - WHY ARE WE SO OFTEN MORE CONCERNED WITH OUR WILL THAN WITH GOD'S WILL?
 - 2. WHAT MUST WE REALIZE AND ACCEPT ABOUT THE RESULTS OF TRUE OBEDIENCE, AS JESUS REALIZED AND ACCEPTED?
 - 3. HOW CAN WE BECOME LESS SELFISH AND MORE SACRIFICIAL IN OUR OBEDIENCE?

4. Jesus modeled God's Word as central to His life and ministry

- 1. He used Scripture to handle temptation (Matthew 4:4)
- 2. He understood that He came to fulfill the O.T. Law (Matthew 5:17)
- 3. Jesus asked the Pharisees to refer back to Scripture (Luke 6:3)
- 4. He rebuked people for not knowing the Word of God (Mark 12:24)
- 5. Jesus recognized Scripture as His guide for knowing the Father's will and understanding His own role in the world (John 19:28)
- 6. DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:
 - 1. WHAT PREVENTS US FROM HAVING A FULLER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE?
 - 2. WHAT WOULD HAPPEN IF WE, LIKE JESUS, FULLY LIVED THE UNDERSTANDING THAT SCRIPTURE SHOULD BE THE GUIDING STANDARD IN OUR LIVES?
 - 3. DO WE DEMONSTRATE THAT WE BELIEVE SCRIPTURE SHOULD BE THE LENS THROUGH WHICH WE UNDERSTAND OUR ROLE IN THE WORLD? WHY OR WHY NOT?

5. Christ consistently modeled the pattern of exalting His Father in every area of life

- 1. He made sure His disciples knew that everything He had been given had come from the Father (John 17:17)
- 2. Again and again, Jesus claimed, "I do nothing on my own.... Rather, it is the Father, living in me, who is doing his work" (John 8:28; 14:10)
- 3. Jesus acknowledged that His entire ministry was to bring glory to the Father (John 17:1–4)
- 4. DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:
 - 1. IS EVERYTHING WE DO BRINGING GLORY TO THE FATHER? IF NOT, WHY NOT?
 - 2. HOW DO WE SOMETIMES DEMONSTRATE THAT WE SEEK THE GLORY INSTEAD OF GIVING IT TO GOD?
 - 3. HOW CAN WE TRANSFORM OUR LIVES TO BRING GLORY TO GOD IN EVERY MOMENT?

6. Jesus modeled intentional relationships of love and integrity throughout His life

- 1. Part of the reason for Jesus' coming to earth was so that deity could dwell among us, and relate to us (John 1:14)
- 2. Jesus built loving relationships with a core group of people who were transformed in love through those relationships (John 13:34–35)
- 3. DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:
 - 1. IF THIS WAS THE MODEL JESUS USED IN MAKING DISCIPLES, WHY DO WE NOT DO IT MORE OFTEN?
 - 2. HOW CAN WE BECOME BETTER AT INTENTIONALLY BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS WITH OTHER BELIEVERS FOR THE PURPOSE OF DISCIPLE MAKING?

THE NEEDS OF PEOPLE IN CHAIR 2 (NOTICE THEY ARE ALL THE SAME THINGS A CHILD NEEDS TO LEARN):

- 1. Children in Christ need to learn their identity in Christ
 - 1. **(WHAT?)** Identity = the fact of being who are what a person or thing is
 - 2. It is important for a child to know their identity in the family (WHY?)
 - 1. So they know whose authority they fall under
 - 2. X So they learn to embrace family values
 - 3. So they don't align themselves with a different family
 - 4. So they are confident of, and comforted by, who their parents are
 - 5. So they can contribute to the good of the family
 - 3. WHEN WAS JESUS REMINDED OF HIS IDENTITY? Jesus was reminded of His identity at His baptism (Matthew 3:17)
 - 4. We must be reminded, because our identity is so different from what it was in the world (Ephesians 2)
 - 1. What were some aspects of our identity in the world?
 - 2. How are we now identified in Christ?
 - 5. We have a completely different identity in Christ
 - 1. SIN HAS NO POWER OVER US Romans 6:1-14
 - 2. THERE IS NO CONDEMNATION Romans 8:31-39
 - 3. JESUS IS WORKING ON OUR BEHALF Hebrews 4:14-16
 - 4. WE HAVE ETERNAL LIFE Romans 6:23
 - 5. WE HAVE BLESSINGS OF THE HOLY SPIRIT Galatians 5:22-23; Acts 2:38
 - 6. WE HAVE TRUE PEACE AND HOPE Romans 15:13; 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18
 - 7. WE ARE PART OF GOD'S FAMILY Ephesians 2:19-22
 - 6. Being aware of our identity is not just knowing WHO we are, but WHOSE we are

- 7. Satan tempted Jesus' identity right after baptism (Matthew 4) We must not be fooled into thinking he doesn't do the same with us
 - 1. How has Satan tempted YOUR identity, or how might he tempt the identity of believers?
- 8. According to Ephesians 2, how can we embrace our identity?
 - 1. By participating in the work of God Ephesians 2:10
- 9. DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:
 - 1. WHAT WERE SOME OF THE ASPECTS OF OUR IDENTITY IN THE WORLD ACCORDING TO EPHESIANS 2?
 - 2. HOW ARE WE NOW IDENTIFIED IN CHRIST ACCORDING TO EPHESIANS 2?
 - 3. HOW DO SOMETIMES DEMONSTRATE WE FAIL TO SEE OURSELVES THROUGH THE LENS OF OUR NEW IDENTITY IN CHRIST?
 - 4. HOW WOULD OUR LIVES CHANGE IF WE STARTED OWNING OUR IDENTITY IN CHRIST?
- 2. Children in Christ need to learn how to walk on their own
 - 1. *** What are the stages of children learning to be mobile from infancy onward?
 - 1. They first learn to roll over
 - 2. Then they learn to sit up
 - 3. Then they learn to scoot themselves around
 - 4. Then they learn to crawl
 - 5. Then they learn to stand
 - 6. Then they learn to take their first wobbly steps
 - 7. Then they learn to walk
 - 8. Then they learn to run
 - 2. ***What is the normal attitude of parents with each of these stages?
 - 3. ***What should be our attitude when new believers take the same steps spiritually?
 - 4. ***What are some of the stages of development that new believers need to go through to learn to walk on their own? (We've already discussed them)
 - 1. Learning to trust in the Holy Spirit
 - 2. Learning to pray
 - 3. Obeying through difficulties

- 4. Becoming Word-Centered
- 5. Exulting God in everything
- 6. Then building new relationships of love and integrity

5. ***Why do children learn to walk?

- 1. Because they see other people doing it!
- 2. Parents
- 3. Grandparents
- 4. Older siblings
- 6. But without models demonstrating this journey, it can take MUCH longer
 - 1. We must encourage new believers to learn to walk
 - 2. We must model it for them
 - 3. We must celebrate the little victories on the way
 - 4. We must help them when they fall
- 7. If infants in Christ do not learn to walk in Christ, they WILL walk in darkness (1 John 1:5-10)
 - 1. We all will learn to walk in something It takes intentionality to walk in Christ
 - 2. 1 John 1:5–10 (ESV) 5 This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light, and in him is no darkness at all. 6 If we say we have fellowship with him while we walk in darkness, we lie and do not practice the truth. 7 But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. 8 If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. 9 If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. 10 If we say we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us.

1. ***What are the two choices here?

- 1. Walking in light
- 2. Walking in darkness
- 2. ***What are the characteristics of "Christians" who walk in darkness?
 - 1. Lie
 - 1. What are they lying about?
 - 2. How many lying "Christians" do we have out there?
 - 3. Could you be lying to yourself?
 - 2. Do not practice the truth

- 3. ***What would you expect the tell-tale signs to be of a "believer" in the church who is still walking in darkness?
 - 1. No Fellowship
 - 2. Not living in good works Ephesians 2:10
- 4. ***What does it mean to "practice the truth"?
 - 1. To live out the things the truth indicates
- 5. ***WALKING IN THE LIGHT What does it NOT mean to "walk in the light" according to this context?
 - 1. It doesn't mean to not sin, since we are told that we all sin

 - 4. How many of us as Christians have learned to "talk"?

- Once a child learns to talk, what do they talk about?

TEXT: Psalm 71:14–21 (ESV) 14 But I will hope continually and will praise you yet more and more. 15 My mouth will tell of your righteous acts, of your deeds of salvation all the day, for their number is past my knowledge. 16 With the mighty deeds of the Lord God I will come; I will remind them of your righteousness, yours alone. 17 O God, from my youth you have taught me, and I still proclaim your wondrous deeds. 18 So even to old age and gray hairs, O God, do not forsake me, until I proclaim your might to another generation, your power to all those to come. 19 Your righteousness, O God, reaches the high heavens. You who have done great things, O God, who is like you? 20 You who have made me see many troubles and calamities will revive me again; from the depths of the earth you will bring me up again. 21 You will increase my greatness and comfort me again.
